1. Decision

The granting of this environmental authorisation includes the conditions set out below.



3. Conditions of Authorisation

Scope of authorisation

- 3.1. Authorisation of the activity is subject to the conditions contained in this authorisation, which form part of the environmental authorisation and are binding on the holder of the authorisation.
- 3.2. Commencement for the purposes of all conditions of this authorisation means the start of any physical implementation in furtherance of the activity, including site preparation, clearance of vegetation, and any other action on the site.
- 3.3. The holder of the authorisation must ensure compliance with these conditions by any person acting on his or her behalf, including but not limited to, an agent, subcontractor, employee or person rendering a service to the holder of the authorisation.
- 3.4. The activity which is authorised may only be carried out at the property indicated above.
- 3.5. Any changes to, or deviations from, the project description set out in this authorisation must be approved, in writing, by the Department before such changes or deviations may be effected. In assessing whether to grant such approval or not, the Department may request such information as it deems necessary to evaluate the significance and impacts of such changes or deviations and it may be necessary for the holder of the authorisation to apply for further authorisation in terms of the regulations.
- 3.6. In the event that the impacts exceed the significance as predicted in the basic assessment report, the authorisation may be suspended and/or withdrawn after proper procedures have been followed.
- 3.7. In the event of any dispute concerning the significance of a particular impact, the opinion of the Department in respect of its significance will prevail.
- 3.8. The Department may change or amend any of the conditions of this authorisation if, in the opinion of the Department, it is environmentally justified.
- 3.9. This environmental authorisation is granted for a period of forty (40) years from the date of authorisation. The activity must commence and be concluded within ten (10) years from the date of this environmental authorisation.
- 3.10. The holder of this authorisation is responsible for compliance with the provisions for Duty of Care and Remediation of Environmental Damage contained in Section 28 of the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 (Act 107 of 1998).
- 3.11. This authorisation does not negate the holder of the authorisation's responsibility to comply with any other statutory requirements that may be applicable to the undertaking of the activity, including, inter alia, the National Forests Act, 1998 (Act 84 of 1998), the National Water Act, 1998 (Act 36 of 1998), Conservation of Agricultural Resources Act, 1983 (Act 43 of 1983), as amended, the National Heritage Resources Act, 1999 (Act 25 of 1999), and the National Environmental Management: Biodiversity Act, 2004 (Act 10 of 2004).

Appeal of authorisation

- 3.12. The applicant must, in writing, within fourteen (14) days of the date of the decision on the application ensure that
 - a) All registered interested and affected parties are provided with access to the decision and the reasons for such decision.



- b) The attention of all registered interested and affected parties is drawn to the fact that an appeal may be lodged against the decision in terms of the National Appeal Regulations 2014, if such appeal is available in the circumstances of the decision.
- c) The decision includes the complete environmental authorisation granted or refused.

Management and monitoring of the activities

- 3.13. The Environmental Management Programme (EMPr) dated April 2024 submitted as Appendix H of the basic assessment report (BAR) is hereby approved, and must be implemented and adhered to throughout the lifecycle of the activity.
- 3.14. Prior to commencement, plant species of conservation concern (endemic, protected, Red Data), must be identified and marked, and may not be disturbed, or, where required, the relevant permits for their relocation or removal must be obtained from the relevant authority.
- 3.15. Any plant species categorized as Endangered or Critically Endangered in terms of the Red List of South African Plants must be conserved *in situ*.
- 3.16. Plant species of conservation concern that are identified for relocation must be relocated to areas of similar habitat that will not be transformed, unless otherwise stipulated by the relevant permitting authority. Such species must be monitored and managed until such time that they have, in consultation with the ECO, been determined to be successfully re-established.
- 3.17. The disturbance of nests or breeding activities of birds, reptiles, or any other wildlife, is strictly prohibited.
- 3.18. Prior to commencement, an independent avian specialist must conduct a preconstruction inspection to identify potential Red List species that may be breeding within the project footprint. The avian specialist must, accordingly, produce a detailed site-specific management plan that ensures that breeding species are adequately managed throughout the construction phase.
- 3.19. Bird Flight Diverters must be fitted to all spans according to the Eskom Engineering Instruction (Eskom Unique Identifier 240-93563150: The utilization of Bird Flight Diverters on Eskom Overhead Lines).
- 3.20. The development of pylons is prohibited from taking place within the following buffer zones, as per Figure 5.5 of the Aquatic Biodiversity Assessment dated January 2023 as included in the BAR dated April 2024:
 - Not closer than 79m to Channeled Valley Bottom CVB_1 and CVB_2
 - Not closer than 79m to Unchanneled Valley Bottom UVB 1 and UBV 2
 - Not closer than 79m to Hillside Seepage Seep_1, Seep_2, Seep_3, Seep_5, Seep_7, Seep_8 and Seep_9
 - Not closer than 35m to Unchanneled Valley Bottom UVB 3
 - Not closer than 35m to Hillslope Seepage Seep 6
 - Not closer than 15m to Channeled Valley Bottom CVB 3
 - Not closer than 15m to Hillslope seepage Seep 4
 - A 100m buffer on all CBA: Irreplaceable and CBA: Wetlands must be delineated and observed as buffer zones as per the recommendations by the Mpumalanga Tourism and Parks Agency dated 12 March 2024 must be adhered to.
- 3.21. The development of the offtaker substation and access roads and any other associated instrastructure is prohibited from taking place within 79m of a wetland or watercourse.



- 3.22. All vertebrates, including slow moving reptiles and smaller mammals, must be allowed to move unharmed, or be assisted and relocated in consultation with the Environmental Control Officer, to areas of similar habitat that will not be transformed.
- 3.23. The applicant must appoint an independent Environmental Control Officer (ECO) that will have the responsibility of monitoring and reporting on compliance with the conditions of this environmental authorisation as well as monitoring and reporting on the implementation of the final EMPr.
 - The ECO must be appointed before commencement and the Department must be notified of such an appointment for communication purposes.
 - The ECO must oversee the identification, and relocation or removal of plant species of conservation importance.
 - The ECO must oversee the identification of endangered or critically endangered plant species, which must be reported to Mpumalanga Tourism and Parks Agency and conserved in situ.
 - The ECO must oversee faunal search and rescue prior to and during site clearing activities.
 - The ECO must oversee all surveying and demarcation activities.
 - The ECO must monitor contractors' entry into sensitive habitat.
 - The ECO must monitor the restriction of vegetation clearance and construction to designated areas.
 - The ECO must oversee the implementation of an alien plant control program.
 - The ECO must maintain the following on site: A site diary; copies of all reports submitted to the Department; and a complaints register of all public complaints and the remedies applied to such complaints
 - During the construction phase, the ECO must submit monthly compliance reports to the Department in writing and copy the applicant with such reports. Where applicable, the ECO may negotiate the required frequency for the submission of reports with the Department, which must be agreed to in writing by the Department. The reports must include a description of all activities on site, problems identified, transgressions noted and remedial action implemented. All reports must reflect the Department's reference number of the project on the cover page.
 - The ECO must oversee and monitor the success of all rehabilitation activities.
 - The ECO must remain employed until all rehabilitation measures as well as site clean-up are completed and the site is handed over to the applicant by the contractor for operation.
- 3.24. The disturbed areas must be rehabilitated as soon as possible with local indigenous plants to enhance conservation of existing natural vegetation on site.
- 3.25. The holder of the authorisation must submit an environmental compliance audit report to the Department within 30 days of completion of the construction phase. The environmental audit report must indicate the date of the audit, the name of the auditor and the outcome of the audit in terms of compliance with the conditions of this authorisation as well as the requirements of the EMPr.
- 3.26. The Department retains the right to monitor or inspect the proposed project throughout its lifecycle.



Commissioning and operation of the activity

- 3.27. Fourteen (14) days written notice must be given to the Department that the activity will commence. The notice must include a date on which it is anticipated that the activity will commence, and must include the name and contact details of the appointed ECO.
- 3.28. The perimeter of the area to be cleared must be defined and demarcation of material lay down areas must precede all activities on site.
- 3.29. The activities must not cause or result in the impediment of any watercourses.
- 3.30. The removal of material on site may not result in the destabilization of watercourse banks adjacent or downstream.
- 3.31. Topsoil must be stockpiled at a height not exceeding 1.5m at a pre-designated location for use during landscaping.
- 3.32. Topsoil stockpiles may not have slopes steeper than 1:2.5 and may not be compacted in any way or stockpiled for a period longer than 6 months.
- 3.33. No surface storm water generated as a result of the activity may be channeled directly into any wetland or watercourse.
- 3.34. Storm water management must be implemented to prevent the ingress of runoff into excavations and to prevent contaminated runoff into watercourses.
- 3.35. Surface water rich in sediments and other pollutants must be prevented from entering any watercourse or wetland, and all mechanisms for dissipating water energy must be implemented at the inception of the construction phase.
- 3.36. Increased runoff due to vegetation clearance, soil compaction or any hardened surfaces must be managed, and steps must be taken to ensure that storm water does not lead to bank instability and excessive levels of silt entering watercourses.
- 3.37. Scouring, erosion or sedimentation of all watercourses must be prevented, and the stability of watercourses may not be detrimentally affected.
- 3.38. Where ablution facilities for construction personnel are required, dry chemical toilet facilities or e-loos must be provided on site at a ratio of 1:10 for construction staff. Ablution facilities may not be located within 100m from any watercourse.
- 3.39. Chemical toilets must be maintained and cleaned regularly and effluent must be disposed of off-site into an approved municipal sewage system.
- 3.40. The storage and handling of fuel, lubricants and other chemicals must be in especially demarcated impervious and bunded areas.
- 3.41. The mixing of cement, asphalt, chemicals or other noxious materials must be undertaken in designated areas on, as far as practicable, an impermeable layer.
- 3.42. Environmental contamination as a result of oil, fuel or hydraulic fluid leakages must be prevented.
- 3.43. Pollution due to improper storage of construction materials or any hazardous substances is prohibited.
- 3.44. It is the responsibility of the holder of the authorisation to rectify any source of pollution from their undertaking and to take appropriate measures to prevent any pollution of surface as well as underground water.
- 3.45. All general waste generated on the site must be disposed of in a registered landfill site or as directed by any other relevant authority, and hazardous waste must be disposed of at an official registered site, or be removed by registered hazardous waste contractors.



- 3.46. Construction personnel must be sensitized to the requirements of the South African Heritage Resources Act. Should any material of cultural or archaeological significance be encountered during construction, all activities must cease immediately and the South African Heritage Resources Agency (SAHRA) must be informed accordingly.
- 3.47. Complaints received from the public during the construction and operational phases of the activity must be attended to as soon as possible and addressed to the satisfaction of all concerned.

General

- 3.48. A copy of this authorisation must be kept at the property where the activity will be undertaken. The authorisation must be produced to any authorised official of the Department who requests to see it and must be made available for inspection by any employee or agent of the holder of the authorisation who works or undertakes work at the property.
- 3.49. Where any of the applicant's contact details change, including the name of the responsible person, the physical or postal address and/ or telephonic details, the applicant must notify the Department as soon as the new details become known to the applicant.
- 3.50. Non-compliance with a condition of this authorisation may result in criminal prosecution or other actions provided for in the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 and the regulations.
- 3.51. National government, provincial government, local authorities or committees appointed in terms of the conditions of this authorisation or any other public authority shall not be held responsible for any damages or losses suffered by the applicant or his successor in title in any instance where vegetation clearance be temporarily or permanently stopped for reasons of non-compliance by the applicant with the conditions of authorisation as set out in this document or any other subsequent document emanating from these conditions of authorisation.

2. Information considered in making the decision.

In reaching its decision, the Department took the following into consideration:

a) The information contained in the application form received by the Department on 23 February 2024 and acknowledged on 28 February 2024.



- b) The information contained in the basic assessment report and the environmental management programme dated April 2024, received by the Department on 18 April 2024 and acknowledged on 24 April 2024.
- c) The findings of the site visit conducted by Okwethu-kuhle Fakude, Sindisiwe Mbuyane and Clifford Kubheka from the Department, together with Ms Aslea Strong from WSP and Megan Govender from Enertrag on 23 May 2024.
- d) The comments from the Mpumalanga Tourism and Parks Agency dated 12 March 2024 as included in the basic assessment report.
- e) The comments from the Department of Forest, Fisheries and Environment: Biodiversity Conservation dated 25 March 2024, as included in the basic assessment report.
- f) The comments from the South African Heritage Resources Agency dated 5 April 2024, as included in the basic assessment report.
- g) The objective and requirements of relevant legislation, policies and guidelines, including Section 2 of the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 (Act No. 107 of 1998).

3. Key factors considered in making the decision.

All information presented to the Department was taken into account in the Department's consideration of the application. A summary of the issues which, in the Department's view, were of the most significance is set out below:

- a) Biophysical impact
- b) Sustainability
- c) Need and desirability

4. Findings

After consideration of the information and factors listed above, the Department made the following findings:

- a) According to the basic assessment report, the proposed activity is considered to be environmentally, economically and socially sustainable.
- b) According to the basic assessment report, adequate mitigation measures will be implemented to reduce potential impacts to acceptable levels.
- c) Mitigation measures and recommendations outlined in the basic assessment report and environmental management programme are appropriate and practical for implementation, and it is anticipated that they will reduce the significance of potential impacts.

In view of the above, the Department is satisfied that, subject to compliance with the conditions contained in the environmental authorisation, the proposed activities will not conflict with the general objectives of integrated environmental management laid down in Chapter 5 of the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 (Act No. 107 of 1998) and that any potentially detrimental environmental impacts resulting from the proposed activities can be mitigated to acceptable levels. The application is accordingly granted.
